## School Wide Positive Behaviours

This year we are introducing 'School Wide Positive Behaviours' to Koondrook Primary.

Each week we will be looking at an aspect of the Matrix. We will be speaking about the expectations, what we expect to see and hear. Students will be rewarded with tokens when teachers see students displaying the values. Our focus for this week is 'Showing Respect in the School Yard"
Children will be able to use their tokens to purchase rewards from our SWPB shop. A display has been set up in the front foyer.

On Friday $17^{\text {th }}$ August, we are having a Bush Day in the bush out the back of school. It will be a day where the children will be rewarded with activities out in the bush including cubby building, damper over the camp fire and cooking marshmallows. Each class has set expectations that need to be met if children will be allowed to participate in the day such as:

## NAIDOC Week

Last Friday the year $3,4,5,6$ students had some special visitors. They were Uncle Ron and Glenn and they are related to the aborigines. They brang in some special objects for us to look at. They were: a big club type weapon called a wadi, a long paddle type tool, a bark cutting stone and there were grinding stones which were used for grinding ochre, seeds and grains. Back in the days when the First Fleet happened Aborigines didn't wear much clothing. They hunted emus and ate emu's eggs, they ate kangaroos, geckos, possums, and they also used the possum skins to make coats, and they ate fish too. They made their houses called Humpy's out of sticks and bark. They got bark off the trees with the cutting stones and the camp oven was called a midden. NAIDOC week started in the early 1960s. We will be seeing Uncle Ron and Glenn on our bush day and they will be doing a smoking ceremony. A big thank you Glenn and Uncle Ron for coming in and teaching us things about NAIDOC week and we can' $\dagger$ wait to see you again!

## 5/6 Class News

What a busy two weeks we have had! In writing there has been a strong focus on each student creating and publishing their own book for the Kerang District Book Competition and I am proud to say that the majority of students were able to do so. Furthermore, many of the books are outstanding, (in my opinion anyway)! I would like to acknowledge the amazing support Karen Naismith gave to every child to ensure their book was complete. Her editing, advice, suggestions and laminating of the final product ensured we made the deadline. From all of us, thanks heaps Karen!
In Maths we continue to build our knowledge of fractions, both common and decimal; perimeter and area and how to collect data and present that in chart form. We have linked this Maths knowledge into the ERP subject focus, Health. Students have presented their interests in graph or 3D shape form.
To develop our vocabulary, we have been writing a daily Haiku poem. I ask that the students use words to paint a picture. They have been so successful I collated their poems into a class book for the book competition. See some examples below.
For reading we are investing how authors develop setting, atmosphere and characters when writing. To support this, I am reading Victor Kelleher's Taronga as a serial. Retelling what we read is also a reading activity we complete each week.
It is wonderful to have the majority of students reading regularly for a sustained period of time outside of school and furthermore they are excited to share their response to the text with me in their diaries. I really look forward to our book before school conversations.
With the Bush Day looming the students have decided all of our class has to have read and completed a response to text for a minimum of 8 times. Please support your child to achieve this target.
Finally thank you year 5/6 for my great birthday surprise. You are the best!
